

MICHIGAN STATEWIDE VOTER SURVEY 600 SAMPLE – REGISTERED VOTERS

MAY 12, 2023

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METHODOLOGY

The Glengariff Group, Inc. conducted a Michigan statewide survey of registered voters. The 600 sample, live operator telephone survey was conducted on May,7-10, 2023 and has a margin of error of +/-4.0% with a 95% level of confidence. 25.0% of respondents were contacted via landline telephone. 75.0% of respondents were contacted via cell phone telephone. This survey was commissioned by the Detroit Regional Chamber.

KEY FINDINGS

Lay of the Land

* By a margin of 17.6%-71.4%, Michigan voters believe the nation is on the wrong track. The wrong track numbers continue above 60% since December 2021 with the 'right track' numbers equaling their lowest point since May 2022.

* By a margin of 41.9% right track to 46.3% wrong track, Michigan voters have narrowly flipped back to the wrong track.

* By a margin of 37.0% right track to 46.5% wrong track Michigan voters continue to believe the state's economy is on the wrong track. [The May 2023 numbers are statistically identical to the February 2023 numbers assessing Michigan's economic right track.]

The 46.5% who believe the economy is on the wrong track were asked why they believe Michigan's economy was on the wrong track – inflation continues to dominate the responses.

[When asked why they thought the economy was on the wrong track, 45% said inflation in December 2022. 55.7% said inflation in February 2023. 51.1% say inflation in May 2023.]

Top Issue Facing Michigan Sees Some Shifting: Economy and Jobs Now Moving Past Inflation

* Voters were asked what the most important issue was facing Michigan today:

13.6%	The economy and Jobs
11.5%	Inflation/ Cost of goods
11.3%	Crime and gun control
9.0%	Roads and infrastructure
6.6%	Education funding/ Education quality
5.3%	Biden and the Democrats
5.0%	Taxes and government spending
4.8%	Abortion and women's rights

* Inflation has fallen from 25.3% in February 2023 to 11.5% in May 2023, while the economy and jobs has risen to the top spot at 13.6%.

Crime and gun control has moved in to a close third place at 11.3%.

Inflation remains the top issue for Independent voters at 15.3%. The 'economy and jobs' is the top issue for Strong GOP voters at 16.2%. 'Gun control and crime' is the top issue for Strong Democratic voters at 17.2%

72.4% Say They Are Doing Better or the Same

* Voters were asked if they personally were doing better, worse or about the same economically as in the past. Respondents that are doing the same as in the past increased from 42.3% in February to 51.0% in May.

26.1% are doing worse.

21.4% are doing better.

51.0% are doing about the same.

The chart below compares how respondents have answered this question for the past five surveys.

* In past surveys, Republican voters have driven the number that said they are doing worse. But the number of Republicans saying they are doing worse dropped significantly from February to May. 49.7% of Republicans in February said they were doing worse. 38.5% of Republicans in May say they are doing worse.

75% of Voters See Economy Weakening or In Recession

- * Voters were asked which statement best reflected their view of the economy.
 - 2.5% The economy is seeing strong growth.
 - 21.4% The economy is seeing growth, but slow growth.
 - 56.6% The economy is weakening, but we not in a recession.
 - 17.9% The economy is in a recession.
- * In February, 67.8% of voters saw a weakening economy while 30.3% saw a growing economy. The shift from February to May has come among Democratic voters. In February, Strong Democratic voters saw growth by a margin of 59.9%-39.5%. In May, Strong Democratic voters see a weaker economy by a margin of 45.7%-52.2%.

Percentage Expecting Recession Next Year Grows from 49.6% to 56.3%

* 56.3% of voters expect the nation's economy will be in recession next year. That is an increase from 49.6% in February 2023.

The chart below compares responses from February 2023 to May 2023 by party affiliation. The shift in perceptions has come among Democratic and Independent voters.

Despite Easing Inflation, More Voters Expect Inflation to Get Worse

- * When asked if inflation will get better, worse or stay the same in the next year, the percentage of voters that think inflation will get worse increased from 40.9% to 47.7%.
 - 47.7% said inflation will get worse.
 - 31.2% said inflation will stay about the same
 - 15.8% said inflation will get better.
- * In the February survey 42.3% of Democratic voters said they believed that inflation would get better. In the May survey, only 26.3% of Democratic voters believe that inflation will get better.

But Worries About Losing Job Remain Low

* Among voters that are employed, only 17.1% say they are concerned about losing their current job while 81.7% are not concerned.

In February 19.2% were concerned about losing their job.

Only 3.9% of voters are VERY concerned about losing their current job. 64.3% are not at all concerned about losing their current job.

Michiganders Bullish on the State's Future

* Respondents were asked if they were optimistic, pessimistic or indifferent about Michigan's future ten years from now.

65.0% are optimistic.

23.3% are pessimistic.

11.8% are neutral or indifferent.

Democratic voters, voters under 40, and black voters are the most optimistic about Michigan's future. But a majority of all demographic groups are optimistic about Michigan's future.

^{*} Respondents were asked whether they were optimistic or pessimistic about their own future in Michigan ten years from now.

^{17.3%} are pessimistic.

^{9.8%} are indifferent or neutral.

* Voters under 50 were statistically more optimistic than voters over 50.

- * The most pessimistic demographic was voters with household incomes below \$25,000. Only 45.5% were optimistic about their future in Michigan compared to 34.1% that were pessimistic. 18.2% were indifferent.
- * Democratic voters were significantly more optimistic about their future in Michigan.

^{* 76.6%} of college educated voters were optimistic compared to 69.3% of non-college voters.

75.3% See More or the Same Opportunity in Ten Years in Michigan

* Respondents were asked if ten years from now Michigan would have more, less or the same amount of opportunity.

44.9% said Michigan would have more opportunity.

30.4% said Michigan would have the same opportunity.

Only 15.3% said Michigan would have less opportunity.

- * Among the important 18–29-year-old demographic, 54.0% said there would be more opportunity. 37.9% said there would be the same opportunity. *Only 5.7% of 18–29-year-old voters see less opportunity in Michigan in ten years.*
- * 25.0% of Republican voters see less opportunity in Michigan in ten years the highest level of pessimism among any demographic group.

17.3% of Michiganders Believe They Will Be Living Elsewhere in Ten Years

- * Respondents were asked if they think they will be living in Michigan or somewhere else in ten years.
 - 70.1% said they would be living in Michigan.
 - 17.3% thought they would be living elsewhere.
 - 12.1% of respondents just were not sure.
- * Only 55.2% of voters aged 18-29 thought they would be living in Michigan in ten years. 26.4% thought they would be living elsewhere. 18.4% of younger voters were not sure.

* But the largest demographic group that did not see themselves residing in Michigan in ten years were black voters.

Just 52.2% of black voters said they would be living in Michigan. 31.9% said they would be living somewhere else. 15.9% of black voters were unsure.

- * These 17.3% of voters were asked why they would be moving:
 - 26.9% said for better weather.
 - 12.5% said for better jobs and opportunities.
 - 10.6% said they just needed a change.
 - 8.7% said to find a better economy or cost of living.
 - 7.7% said for family reasons.
 - 6.7% said they just had another location in mind.
 - 5.8% said to escape Michigan government or taxes.

16.3% Took New Job in Past Year; Younger, Lower Income Workers Shifted

- * Respondents were asked their employment status one year ago (May 2022):
 - 54.8% had a full-time job.
 - 9.5% had a part-time job.
 - 2.2% were not employed but looking.
 - 0.7% said they were a student.
 - 31.9% said they were not employed, not looking, retired or on disability.

[Note: This question is a shift from previous surveys when respondents were asked their employment status prior to Covid.]

- * Among those that were employed one year ago:
 - 71.8% are in the same job.
 - 16.3% are in a different job.
 - 5.4% are now looking for work.
 - 4.2% have moved to retirement or disability.
 - 2.0% are simply not looking for work right now.
- * 35.8% of those aged 18-29 that were employed one year ago are now in a new job.

* But the greatest variable appears to be income status. The chart below compares those in the same job, new job or looking based on income levels.

Up to 63% of Respondents with A High School Diploma Open to Two Additional Years of School/Training for Higher Paying Job

* Respondents were asked their highest level of education. For those respondents who said a high school diploma, they were asked if they would be interested in getting a job that paid on average 22% more in salary if it required an additional two years of education or training. For those respondents that said no or depends, they were then asked if they would be interested if the education or training were free.

39.8% of respondents with a high school diploma immediately said they would be interested in a job that paid 22% more even if it meant more education or training.

But when told that the education or training was free, 63.4% of respondents with a high school diploma said they would be interested in a job that paid 22% requiring two more years of education or training.

* There is a major difference in those willing to get more education/training by age with 90.3% of high school graduates aged 18-29 open to an additional two years of free education or training.

* Respondents were read thirteen different types of people in their local community and asked on a one to ten scale how much they trust them. The higher the score, the higher the level of trust. Those individuals are ranked from most trusted to least trusted below.

The highest rated (above 7.5) among Democratic respondents are Librarians, Teachers, Small Businesses, Neighbors and Banks

The highest rated (above 7.5) among Republican respondents are Neighbors, Small Businesses, GOP Voters, Law Enforcement, and Clergy.

The highest rated (above 7.5) among Independent respondents are Librarians and Neighbors.

* The lowest rated (below 5.0) among Democratic respondents are Republican voters and CEO's.

- * The lowest rated (below 5.0) among Republican respondents are Democratic voters, reporters, and CEO's.
- * The lowest rated (below 5.0) among Independent respondents are CEO's, reporters, Democratic voters, and elected officials.

Only 47.7% of Voters Have Heard of DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Programs

- * Respondents were told that many companies have what is called diversity, equity and inclusion programs or DEI. They were asked if they had ever heard of DEI programs.
 - 47.7% of respondents have heard of DEI programs while 51.0% have NOT heard of DEI programs.
 - 21.9% have a favorable view of DEI.
 - 14.8% have a negative view of DEI.
 - 11.0% have no opinion of DEI.
- * There are sharply different reactions between Republican voters and Democratic or Independent voters to DEI.

* Respondents were then read a standardized definition of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and asked if they thought DEI was important or not important. By a margin of 78.9%-17.5%, voters believe DEI is important.

65.6% Say Business Has a Role in Michigan Social Issues

* By a margin of 65.6%-23.4%, voters say that businesses do have a role in the debate over social issues in Michigan. A majority of every demographic group believes businesses have a role in the debate over social issues.

74.4% Say Business Should Be Able to Speak Out Free From Government Retribution

* By a margin of 74.4%-14.6%, Michigan voters believe that businesses have a right to speak out and voice their opinions on proposed legislation or issues free from retribution by elected officials.

The lowest level of support was 65.9% among Strong Republican voters with only 22.9% of strong Republicans saying businesses do not have the right to speak out free from retribution.

Whitmer Job Approval Consistent at 54.9%

* Michigan voters approve of Governor Whitmer's job performance by a margin of 54.9%-37.0%. Governor Whitmer's job approval has been consistent in the mid-50's level dating to fall of 2021.

Men approve of Governor Whitmer by a margin of 50.7%-41.3%. Women approve by the large margin of 59.0%-33.3%.

* Michigan voters disapprove of President Biden's job performance by a margin of 33.7%-59.5%. 49.2% of voters STRONGLY DISAPPROVE of President Biden's performance. These numbers are statistically unchanged from February 2023.

2024 Motivation to Vote Sees Minor Dip from February Poll

* Voters were asked on a one to ten scale how motivated they were to vote in next year's Presidential election. The higher the number the higher the motivation. More than 1½ years out, voters are motivated at an 8.9 on a 10.0-point scale a slight reduction from 9.1 in the February survey.

All party affiliations saw a minor decrease in motivation. Motivation among centrist voters is showing signs of weakening. But overall, motivation to vote looks far more like 2018, 2020 and 2022 levels than 2012, 2014 or 2016 levels.
